

The Treasure Coast Pride Festival was a huge success. What an auspicious start for this event. Hats off to Kelli Randell. Jim & Jerry of REBAR. Janet of Club B rd Cage their staffs and all the sponsors, volunteers and vendors that made this happen. It was so spectacular that the sun even came out! If you weren't there this year you need to make sure you're there next year. Speaking of next year, there is talk about moving to Tradition Field on an earlier date (to avoid conflicts and in search of better weather) - it will all be decided by a committee now being formed to handle the event, so if you're interested in getting involved talk to Jim at REBAR or Kelli Randell. The event raised beaucoup dollars for PFLAG Vero Beach.

For those of you who don't remember, Back in August of 2003, when the Indian River County Aids Support Group dissolved, Mark Wygonic brought PFLAG Vero Beach a check from them donating all of their remaining funds. At a **PFLAG Vero Beach** meeting in March 2004 as a result of a discussion on how to use the funds, Salvatore Di Cola, (a Fort Pierce Businessman) proposed that if PFLAG Vero Beach members would vote that very night to use those funds as part of a special aids relief fund, Sal Di Cola would donate One Thousand Dollars to spearhead the fund. Part of the deal was to pass the hat at all PFLAG meetings, parties, etc. and then on World AIDS Day the money would go to help a needy victim of AIDS. The Fund is now in it's second year and to date has fifteen hundred dollars collected (thanks to the generosity of attendees at St. Lucie Pride, June 12th where eight hundred dollars was collected). There will be additional funds raised at PFLAG Vero Beach's Pride Dinner Dance on June 25th, and all of this goes to help other victims this coming December. PFLAG Vero Beach and Sal Di Cola thank all for their generous contributions to this a worthy cause.

Down in West Palm Beach we hear Gary is working on a worthy special event at Kashmir, we won't tell, but you'll know when it happens! Of course the foam party is on the 25th and summer nights are heating up at Kashmir.

And if you can't stand the summer heat, get out of the kitchen and get yourself over to the Rhythm Café in WPB. If you haven't been there (note reservations recommended) and you like food, you should check it out. ## Spiritually Speaking

Did you know that July is National Hot Dog Month? It's also National Baked Bean Month, Peach Month, Blueberry Month, Ice Cream Month and Picnic Month. Detect a theme? You bet! While July is a perfect time for picnics, barbeques and vacations, July is also a great month to go a little deeper and spend time with our spirituality.

Vacations are times when we seek to regain balance in our lives. After months of hard work, we take time off to renew friendships, revisit hobbies and sports, explore new destinations, and just rest. This seeking of balance, this rest, renewal and revisiting is all part of the central disciplines of a spiritual life.

Spirituality is knowing, and practicing, how to separate the essential from the non-essential. Spirituality is about finding and re-finding a sense of balance in our lives. We are all human beings. But all too often, especially in our work lives, we slide over the line and fall into the easy trap of becoming human doings. It is so easy to assess our lives by what we do rather than by who we are. There are endless ways we get rewarded for our doing. And we get even more rewarded for our over-doing! We get paid for a normal work week. Then we get more pay, over time pay at time and a half, if we work more than a normal week. Reward comes from excess doing. Recognition comes, often, from excess doing. Sooner or later we stop wondering if this excess, all this doing, is what we want or what we need or even if it's right for us. We stop reflecting and we're trapped in a relentless cycle of doing, doing more and doing even more than that.

We can temporarily break those cycles

by taking vacations, having picnics, barbeques, relaxing with our friends. We can break the cycles of excess doing by taking time to look within, to rest, to renew our spirits. This is not about right or wrong! This is about how to recognize when we need a break, how to regain balance, how to separate the essential from the non-essential.

There is much to be said for doing. Doing things is how we earn a living, promote our values, care for our loved ones, create art, struggle for justice and bring positive change into our lives. But if we do too much, there is a shadow side. When we get stuck in doing alone we are a high risk for burnout. We get cranky, exhausted, cynical, humorless and self-destructive. This is the point where we have to balance our doing with rest, renewal, acceptance and grace. This is where we need to embrace the spiritual disciplines that teach us we are loved, no matter how much we do or accomplish, we are loved.

But this focus on spiritual renewal can have a shadow side as well. If we spend too long in renewal, too much time looking inward, we run the risk of becoming so self-absorbed that we become isolated from others and we lapse into spiritual narcissism where we loose our concern for the well-being of others. When we sink down that side of the balance, we can gather ourselves up and out again by doing something to help someone else.

This balancing, this movement between human doing and human being is what we need for satisfying and wholesome lives. When we get too tired from all our doing, we need to pull back, rest, renew our sense of connection with the holy, re-



videos and discussion. This promises to be a welcome respite from the ranting of the religious right.

Gay Rights Tidbit: The active bigotry of the religious right has given the Tampa area quite a Pride present: Hillsborough County commissioners passed an ordinance barring the county government from any acknowledgement of Gay Pride, and a second ordinance making it virtually impossible to repeal the first one. It seems one of the commissioners, Ms. Ronda Storms, saw a Gay Pride display at a local library and became so outraged that not only did she orchestrate the display's removal, but when it reappeared much smaller she pushed to have her bigotry enshrined in a county ordinance.

Her successful ordinances were approved without debate or public input. The first motion stated, "I move that we adopt a policy that Hillsborough County government abstain from acknowledging, promoting or participating in gay pride recognition and events – little g, little p." The second motion requires a 5 to 2 supermajority vote, following a public hearing, to repeal the first ordinance.

If you had any doubts about the religious right's intent to total oppress us and to eventually recriminalize our existence, this "gay pride gift" to Tampa should help convince you to get involved now.

## In Our Past

#### "FREEDOM IS NEVER A FINAL ACT"

The Legacy of Bayard Rustin

Bayard Rustin is probably not a name that comes to mind when one stops to think about important figures in lesbian, gay, transgendered, and bisexual history. In fundamentally important ways, there would not be a movement working for the civil rights of GLBT folks if it weren't for the legacy of Rustin. In a month that features the celebration of "inalienable rights", the life and work of Bayard Rustin bears consideration. He believed that "The struggle must be continuous, for freedom is never a final act."

Bayard Rustin was a consummate civil rights strategist and humanitarian. His staunch advocacy of nonviolent resistance shaped the course of social protest from the 1950s through the close of the twentieth century. It was Rustin who brought the message and methods of Gandhi to the United States. Rustin insinuated nonviolence into the heart of the black freedom struggle. It was Rustin who presided over the transformation of direct action tactics into the civil rights struggle. It was these direct action strategies that would influence the Stonewall Rebellion in 1969. The black civil rights movement created the social conditions and political strategies that made the gay rights movement possible. Bayard Rustin was a key strategist in shaping the black civil rights movement and thus laid the groundwork for gay civil rights actions.

Rustin was born in West Chester, Pennsylvania in 1912. He believed that it was his grandmother, Julia Rustin's activism, which profoundly shaped his early thinking. Julia Rustin was a barrier-breaker. She served as a charter member of the newly formed National Association for the Advancement of Colored People (NAACP) in 1910. When African American luminaries

such as W.E.B. Du Bois, James Weldon Johnson, and Mary McLeod Bethune arrived in town to find no guesthouses available to blacks, Julia opened her home to them. Bayard grew up in the presence of these pioneering figures. He heard their stories of lynchings and other acts of racial brutality. Though he had no direct childhood experience of the Ku Klux Klan, their stories left a deep impression.

More than all of this, it was Julia Rustin's Quaker teachings that determined Rustin's notions of nonviolent social protest. Rustin himself said, "My activism did not spring from being black. Rather, it is rooted fundamentally in my Quaker upbringing and the values instilled in me by [my] grandparents....It is very likely that I would have been involved [in civil rights agitation] had I been a white person." The basic Quaker belief, that all people are equal, ran contrary to the Jim Crow laws then governing race relations in the United States. It was the contradiction between Quaker beliefs and Jim Crow politics that pushed Rustin into involvement with the struggle for racial equality. It was his grandmother who impressed upon him that it was his social responsibility to combat racial subordination nonviolently.

Bayard Rustin in turn taught Martin Luther King, Jr. about nonviolent resistance. King had encountered Gandhi's teachings in college textbooks. The finer points of the Indian philosophy of Satyagraha, or "love force," had eluded him until Rustin arrived to teach him. With Rustin's guidance, the Montgomery Bus Boycott of 1956 was the first action of the modern civil rights movement to become a nonviolent protest.

Rustin went on to organize the 1963 March on Washington. This was then the largest public protest in American history. Rustin said the march "made Americans feel for the first time that we were capable of being truly a nation, that we were capable of moving beyond division and bigotry."

Rustin was intimately aware of bigotry. He was not only African American but he was gay. Throughout his long career as an activist Rustin was often an outsider in the very circles in which he labored. He was openly gay throughout his life. In the 1920s, 30s, 40s, and 50s to be an African American gay man was to be considered "deviant" on several levels. There were many times when the perceived political cost of his homosexuality outweighed his value to the civil rights movement and he was shunted to the side, dismissed, or asked to resign from service. Up until quite recently, civil rights historians dealt with Bayard Rustinwhen they chose to include him at all- as a "sideline activist" whose principal purpose was to support King and the movement.

There is probably no other figure who contributed so much to the civil rights movement yet has been so heavily penalized by it. All because he steadfastly refused to disavow his being gay.

A few months before Rustin died he spoke words that resonate for our times. A young admirer asked how he kept hopeful in dismally conservative times. "I have learned a very significant message from the Jewish prophets," Rustin replied. "They taught that God does not require us to achieve any of the good tasks that humanity must pursue. What the gods require of us is that we not stop trying."


