After 14 years, finally legal! Well, at least in Canada, some states here and a few countries in Europe (did you see that Spain legalized gay marriage last month, too). Congratulations. If others send in wedding announcements, we'll print them as we have room.

Gay Rights Tidbit: County Commissioner Rhonda Storms is still storming away over in Hillsborough County. If you do business with a business in that county and can switch to another supplier in another county you should take the only action Republicans understand: economic action. Switch your money out of Hillsborough County and tell your old suppler why. If we pull our business out of Hillsborough County, they'll get Storm out of our business.

Enough on the downers, here's something that was emailed to me – it's Spanish Premier Sapatero's remarks on the occasion of the legalization of gay marriage in Spain. It's good to hear good words on occasion:

July 01, 2005 SPANISH PREMIER ZAPATERO'S REMARKABLE GAY MARRIAGE SPEECH

When the Spanish parliament yesterday took its historic vote legalizing both gay marriage and adoption of children by gay couples, Socialist Prime Minister Jose Luis Rodriguez Zapatero -- who put the full prestige of his office and party behind passage of the gay human rights legislation -- made probably the most remarkable speech in favor of full equality for those with same-sex hearts ever delivered by a head of government anywhere, in which he quoted two of the most illustrious gay poets in history. Here are excerpts from Zapatero's speech:

"We are not legislating, honorable members, for people far away and not known by us. We are enlarging the opportunity for happiness to our neighbors, our co-workers, our friends and, our families: at the same time we are making a more decent society, because a decent society is one that does not humiliate its members. "In the poem 'The Family,' our [gay] poet Luis Cernuda was sorry because, 'How does man live in denial in vain by giving rules that prohibit and condemn?'

"Today, the Spanish society answers to a group of people who, during many years have, been humiliated, whose rights have been ignored, whose dignity has been offended, their identity denied, and their liberty oppressed.

"Today the Spanish society grants them the respect they deserve, recognizes their rights, restores





Spiritually Speaking

Who owns God? We hear so many religious groups claiming that they are right and others are wrong. That is one of the major reasons for the big uproar over same-sex marriages — everyone thinks their opinion is the same as God's. During political campaigns and in justifying wars, leaders will claim that "God is on our side."

Just a couple of weeks ago, the United Church of Christ, a denomination of over 1 million members, lifted their voices in support of same-sex marriage. It hasn't been easy for them. They have been attacked and at least one of their churches has already been the victim of arson.

As I write this column, I am in Calgary Canada. While traveling to Calgary, news reached us that the legislators in Canada had finally approved same-sex marriages for all provinces in Canada. So today, after fifteen years together, after a commitment ceremony 14 years ago and a civil union in Vermont 3 years ago, Mike and I went to get our license to be legally married. By tonight, we will be legally married.

While we are here in Calgary, the Metropolitan Community Church conference will hear speakers from several faith traditions, including the Rt. Rev. Gene Robinson, openly gay Episcopal Bishop of New Hampshire. We will also have the Rt. Rev. Steven Charleston, President of the Episcopal Divinity School. There will be speakers from the United Church of Christ.

Presbyterian, and other faith groups.

So, who owns God? Recently, a pastor told me that it is so difficult to find gay individuals of faith. Many in our community have believed what others have told them about God having nothing to do with people in the gay and lesbian community.

Here in Calgary this week, there are a few thousand individuals (four hotels full) who are openly gay and lesbian people of faith. We are Christians joined by a few Jewish friends. We are from Baptist, Catholic, Presbyterian, Episcopal, Pentecostal, and almost every other faith you can name. I even met one person last night who is from one of the most conservative Christian universities in the world – Bob Jones University in South Carolina. Attending that school and even working at that school after graduation could not prevent her from being lesbian.

Who owns God? I think the answer is obvious – no one does. While people sit and argue about it, the real answer is in asking a different question: Who are God's people? We all are God's children. It doesn't matter what our past is or what our orientation might be. We don't own God.

I am so thankful for faith traditions that are joining their voices with the Metropolitan Community Churches and beginning to be heard. Thank God for the voices of the Unitarian Universalists, the Unity Churches, and the United



In Our Past

PROVINCETOWN

With vacation time upon us, it is nice to think about places that represent rest, relaxation and liberation. There are places in this country where it has been possible to find all three – all at the same time! Vacation places famous for their hospitality to gay, lesbian, bisexual, and transgender folk, like San Francisco, Fire Island, and South Beach come immediately to mind. One of the oldest spots in the country where gay folk have been finding their way for decades is Provincetown. In its illustrious history it has been called "A Gay Mecca."

Provincetown, or "Land's End", as it was called is a narrow strip of sand located at the outermost curve of Cape Cod, Massachusetts. On August 5, 1910, the dedication ceremonies for the Provincetown Pilgrim Monument were held, commemorating the spot where the Pilgrims first made landfall in North America. Over the years, Provincetown has meant different things to different people. For gay folk, Provincetown has been called "Queersville, U.S.A." The town's history is inextricably tied to our history.

Provincetown is nearly an island. Its geographic dimensions have been critical to its economic and demographic changes over the decades. It is surrounded by water on three sides – the Atlantic Ocean to the north, Cape Cod Bay to the west, and Provincetown Harbor to the south. It is bordered by only one town, Truro. More than one thousand acres of Sahara-like sand dunes lean up against its four miles of length and barely two streets of width. Only 8.35 square miles of land, but 21.3 miles of tidal shoreline give Provincetown its distinct features.

From the seventeenth to the twentieth

centuries, Provincetown residents used the sea as its choicest asset. The manufacture of salt combined with whaling, fishing, trading, and smuggling gave residents ample opportunities for creating a livelihood. Anglo-Saxon "Yankees" were the first to make Provincetown their home. They made fortunes in the whaling and cod-fishing industries. They built an economic empire and dominated the town's cultural, political, and religious structures. They also hired Portuguese sailors from the Azores.

Portuguese immigrants started out as fishermen but as that industry dwindled they soon moved into entrepreneurial ventures like barber shops, bakeries, grocery stores, and restaurants. As Provincetown moved from fishing village to resort town it was Portuguese Americans who staffed this evolution. Portuguese fishermen turned their fishing boats into excursion boats and Portuguese women cooked in local restaurants and worked in retail stores. Portuguese women joined the entrepreneurial upswing and opened boarding houses for the tourists discovering Provincetown.

It was the arrival of artists at the end of the nineteenth century and Provincetown's establishment as an artist colony that paved the way for an openness to gay and lesbian people. Tennessee Williams painted a festive portrait of a flourishing gay world in Provincetown during the early and mid-1940s. He wrote, "I have just returned from a most extraordinary all night party on Captain Jack's Wharf, as a mater [of fact] the third consecutive of a series, but this the most extraordinary of all."

destinations. The clubs spearheading this entertainment culture included the Weathering Heights Club, the Atlantic House, the Pilgrim House, the Moors Restaurant, and the Townhouse. By the 1950s Provincetown's visiting and native lesbians and gav men had created a gay world at Land's End. The ritual that organized social life was and is the "tea dance". The parade began at approximately four o'clock from the beach down the road to the Moors Bar and Restaurant. An elaborate cocktail hour featured a piano player who orchestrated at least one hour of audience participation comedy skits and Broadway show sing-a longs. At five o'clock, the revelers made their way down a sandy path to the Weathering Heights Club where the infamously "big queen" Phil Baoine was the headline feature. A number of crossdressing men and women waited on tables and performed as Baoine's "Weathering Knights". Dinner would follow. Places like the Bonnie Doone Restaurant or the Flagship Bar and Restaurant were favorite destinations.

Provincetown continues to be a destination where fantasy and freedom coexist. In its history we can find important pieces of lesbian and gay culture on which to build.







their dignity, affirms their identity, and restores their liberty.

"It is true that they are only a minority, but their triumph is everyone's triumph. It is also the triumph of those who oppose this law, even though they do not know this yet: because it is the triumph of Liberty. Their victory makes all of us (even those who oppose the law) better people, it makes our society better.

"Honorable members, There is no damage to marriage or to the concept of family in allowing two people of the same sex to get married. To the contrary, what happens is this class of Spanish citizens get the potential to organize their lives with the rights and privileges of marriage and family.

There is no danger to the institution of marriage, but precisely the opposite: this law enhances and respects marriage.

"Today, conscious that some people and institutions are in a profound disagreement with this change in our civil law, I wish to express that, like other reforms to the marriage code that preceded this one, this law will generate no evil, that its only consequence will be the avoiding of senseless suffering of decent human beings. A society that avoids senseless suffering of decent human beings is a better society.

"With the approval of this Bill, our country takes another step in the path of liberty and tolerance that was begun by the democratic change of government.

"Our children will look at us incredulously if we tell them that many years ago, our mothers had less rights than our fathers, or if we tell them that people had to stay married against their will even though they were unable to share their lives. Today we can offer them a beautiful lesson: every right gained, each access to liberty has been the result of the struggle and sacrifice of many people that deserve our recognition and praise.

"Today we demonstrate with this Bill that societies can better themselves and can cross barriers and create tolerance by putting a stop to the unhappiness and humiliation of some of our citizens.

"Today, for many of our countrymen, comes the day predicted by Kavafis [the great Greek gay poet] one century ago: 'Later 'twas said of the most perfect society/someone else, made like me/certainly will come out and act freely.' "
