They are a reflection of the reality that each of us one day may also live.

We call ourselves community but sometimes we place "exclusives" on our actions. We plan activities and events and don't seem to remember that there is an element of "our community" that badly needs our attention in so many ways. We think every Christmas about the needs of Children (which is great)! But what about that senior that will not receive a card, a call, a meal, or any acknowledgement at all that they too, are just as in need if not more, than many children. Most children have some form of parental and/or

sibling relationships they celebrate dailyyear round. Many of our seniors no longer have family, loved ones or anyone to care for them or have any real awareness that anyone cares for them. Many have no children of their own.

Some may say, "That is not my problem." Well my friends some years in the future it may just be YOUR challenge and YOUR problem. How would you like to face that challenge utterly alone with NO one to care, no one to be any kind of support or appreciation?

Florida is a unique place where most of us have moved here from somewhere else. We came here for many, many different reasons and the years do pass. We do have families that are spread out over vast miles, and many of our Seniors have no family to call their own.

There has been much discussion on the rate of suicide among our young and you don't hear as much the challenge of suicide among our elderly. It's very real in our own community, its just not something we wish to look at, and I challenge you to take a look at this and make a difference even if it is one act of kindness. it all makes a difference.

I plead for your compassion on behalf of our 'Senior" community. If your setting up for an event, call, invite or offer transportation to one of our senior members. When you plan out Thanksgiving or Christmas this year, set a place setting for one of our own "Seniors" who needs you badly. If you know a homebound, offer to pick up a prepared meal for them and pay them a short visit or take them shopping or to a movie. This is a life-giving experience for them and one I'm sure will touch your heart also.

All life has value and worth no matter what the age or the demographic and we will all pass through some of the same challenges and obstacles. Let us gift and appreciate our



In Our Past

By the time this issue of OOTC hits newsstands, a new school year will be well underway. It seemed an appropriate time to begin a series of inter-related columns on the contributions lesbian women have made to advance the professional possibilities for all women in the United States. With this September column we will examine lesbian women's contributions to the development of higher education opportunities for women; in October we will look at how lesbian women created new possibilities in professional ordained ministry; in November we will view how lesbian women organized new roles for women in the world of medicine: and in December the field of social work and its connections to lesbian women will be explored. What all of these columns will have in common is once again the recognition of the presence of lesbian women and men of all colors and social class backgrounds involved in expanding the possibilities for the widest array of people as possible.

"Who will bake the pies?"

In the eighteenth and nineteenth centuries in the United States education of females of any color and from any social class was minimal. For instance, from 1789 to 1822, girls were allowed to attend the public schools during the summer only and for two hours in the afternoon during the school year, after the boys had gone home.

Women and, in significant numbers, lesbian women led the way in the early 19th century to change not only the thinking about women and education but the practice of how women would be educated.

Emma Willard led the way. When she founded the Trov Female Seminary [in the 19th century "seminary" referred to a secondary school, roughly the equivalent of our present day high schools] in Troy, New York, it was considered "revolutionary" since it intended to provide "serious study" for girls, including courses such as algebra and physiology.

By the decades immediately prior to the American Civil War, the 1830, 40s, and 50s, the Troy Female Seminary was joined by similar institutions across the country, including the Georgia Female College, in Macon founded in 1836 and the Tennessee and Alabama Female Institute, in Winchester, Tennessee founded in 1851. The drawback to these institutions however, was that they only enrolled white women.

Mary Lyon built on the work of Emma Willard by deciding to found a school that would encourage women to become not only teachers but also educators. She wanted to devise a curriculum that would generate the finest possible professional group of educators then known. Lyon formulated her plans with the help of her partner Zilpah Grant. Together the two women devised a curriculum for young women that included what young men were being taught in the best academies. This included chemistry, astronomy, and natural philosophy.

Emma Willard and Mary Lyon challenged a society that felt that educating women would "unsex" them or even worse turn them into "mental hermaphrodites" and "semi-women." The concern was also expressed in the query, "Who will bake the pies?" Oberlin College which opened its doors to women students in 1831 avoided this criticism by arguing that they would admit women in order "to prepare them to become the useful wives of the male graduates."

The tremendous upheaval caused by the Civil War promoted significant change in the attitudes towards educating women. This shift would benefit not only white women but also finally African American women. The effort to provide a college education for African American women was initiated by two white women from the north, who were a couple. Sophia Packard and Harriet Giles. Their devotion to one another fueled their devotion to the cause of women.

In 1881, Packard and Giles founded Spelman



College in Atlanta, Georgia. Both women were interested in the welfare of the freed slaves and on a trip to the South in 1880 they decided to start a school for African-American women.

Sophia Packard died in 1891. Harriet Giles continued to run the school, which became the foremost school in the country for African American women. At Giles death in 1909 she was buried next to Packard, the woman she had shared her life and life's work with for almost forty years. A single tombstone covers both their graves. It bears their names on one side and on the other is the inscription, "Founders of Spelman Seminary."

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



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
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
