



We give thanks in November with food, family, and friends. We give gifts in December surrounded by festive decorations, colorful lights, and holiday music. And we give cheers, kisses, and resolutions as this year passes over to the next. What a wonderful way to bring to close one year before moving onto the next.

There's a sense of renewal. Maybe this wasn't a very good year for you; it might even have been your worst. Maybe it was your best year yet. Whatever this year was to you, you know the next one will be different. You make well-meaning resolutions with that sense of hope, that sense of change.

There was a sense of change a couple of thousand years ago that began with a small infant lying in a manger in a stable. A baby that would change the world. Shepherds in the fields were the first to find out about this birth, what it would mean, and rejoiced. A star in the east brought some wise men looking for this child to share in the celebration; a message of hope and a message of love.

I know that that is not an easy thing for some in our community to accept. There are some who have been hurt badly by their church growing up, made to feel unworthy and unaccepted, so they have anger or disgust towards organized religion. Then there are others who, because of the religion they were raised in, having trouble accepting that they are gay and keep trying to go "straight". Even though everyone else knows they are gay.

The Episcopal Church opens itself more and more to accepting us, even choosing an openly gay bishop. But within this denomination there are those who disagree with that idea and have split off from the church. Now let's go back to that little baby in the manger in swaddling clothes. 

In Our Past

"Involving the use of all her faculties."

Jane Addams and Mary Rozet Smith

Jane Addams graduated from Rockford College in 1882. At that time, there were few professions open to college-educated women. After graduating, Addams had no idea what she wanted to do with the rest of her life and with opportunities slim to near invisible, Addams experienced a terrible depression. This depression was exacerbated the year following her graduation when she went to Europe for "finishing" as young women of her social class often did. The trip that was intended to "finish" her as a refined young woman of the upper class instead became a beginning.

While in London, Addams visited East London where she saw up close the horrible poverty and misery in which much of humanity lived. Her upper-middle class upbringing had sheltered her from any knowledge of this world. Addams, later in her life, would claim that it was this European experience, which made her understand that her "modern" education, which stuffed a young woman with culture and nothing more, was useless.

If there was one thing Jane Addams was determined <u>not</u> to be it was useless. Jane Addams took the eye-opening experience of her European trip and returned to the United States and fashioned a new career opportunity for herself and scores of other college-educated women. Jane Addams founded what would be come known as the social work profession. She did this by opening the first settlement house in the United States. Hull House, as it was called, was located in Chicago and it would become the first of many settlement houses throughout the United States.

Jane Addams became the nation's conscience. She constantly pointed out that what Hull House was doing – child care and food programs for the poor to name just two of their dozens of programs – should be done all over the country and would be much better accomplished by the federal government. She argued that private beneficence was good and necessary but not sufficient to deal with the disinherited of the urban world.

Jane Addams was also clear that she could not have founded Hull House nor sustained her work for justice and peace were it not for the support and love she found in her primary relationships with women. Addams had absolutely no interest in heterosexual marriage. She spent her adult years with other women in long-term relationships. Today, we would describe Jane Addams as a lesbian. In her own day the term was not used.

Jane Addams first important relationship was with Ellen Starr. Jane and Ellen were students together at Rockford Female Seminary in Illinois. Their relationship began in 1877. They were 19 years old when they met and their relationship grew slowly from a friendship to a more romantic friendship and then to a "Boston marriage" as women's intimate samesex relationships were then described.

It was with Ellen Starr that Jane Addams first had the idea to open a settlement house in the United States. In 1888, Jane and Ellen traveled to Europe together, and in London visited Toynbee Hall, a settlement house that brought male Oxford students to live and work among the poor. From that visit the idea of Hull House was born.

By 1889 they had founded Hull House and in doing so inaugurated the settlement house movement in the United States. But for Jane Addams what mattered more was that she was at long last joined with a partner. She wrote to Ellen during this period, "Let's love each other through thick and thin and work out a salvation." Their salvation at this time was their love for one another.

As Ellen Starr began to move in different direction her intimate relationship with Jane Addams came to an end. Jane Addams in her autobiography was always clear in crediting Starr as being her partner in the establishment of Hull House. Their fifteen-year relationship empowered each woman. Jane Addams found her great love with Mary Rozet Smith. The historian Lillian Faderman notes in her book, To Believe in Women: What Lesbians Have Done for America — A History, "Yet a perusal of their correspondence leaves little doubt of the romance and commitment of their relationship and the fact that they considered themselves a married couple."

Jane Addams and Mary Rozet Smith enjoyed a forty year committed relationship together. Mary died of pneumonia in 1934. Jane was devastated by Mary's death. She herself **Working Together We Can be Creative**

was ill at the time. She wrote to her nephew, James Linn: "I suppose I could have willed my heart to stop beating, but the thought of what she had been to me for long kept me from being cowardly." Jane survived Mary by only fourteen months.

Thanks in large measure to the work of Jane Addams, a new generation of college-educated women would find professions waiting for them. Many of those women would continue the legacy of Jane Addams, Mary Rozet Smith and Ellen Starr.
