



Gay Rights Tidbits: Nine months after a student publication first disclosed that the School District of Palm Beach County had filtered out access to gay supportive web sites from the School District's computers, those filters have been removed. "Allowing access to up-to-date information provided by the Gay, Lesbian Straight Education Network (GLSEN) and other supportive organizations will assist administrators, faculty and students in making our public schools a more accepting environment for all students. Spiritually Speaking

There's a meditation book on my shelf titled, "Each Day A New Beginning." It's a wonderful collection of encouragement and wisdom. I benefit from the reminder that no matter what sort of a rut or low spot in which my spirit has become stuck, I can get out of it! Each day, no matter what patterns of sadness, boredom, unease or danger I've fallen into, I can change direction. I find that comforting. And, this time of year. I find that exhausting!

The pace of my life picks up in December. The holidays bring extra expectations at the church where I work. There are parties and extra services, and folks to visit. My personal life gets busy with social events. Family from the cold north come for warmth and tradition. I still try to get cards written to far flung friends. And shopping? Thank God for the internet! And there are some days, when everyone I know is wrapped up in social events, that I feel especially alone this time of year. The last thing I want at this time of the year is the thought of starting over each and every day. I don't want to start over! I want a break!

But isn't that part of what we expect in our celebration of the New Year? New Years is a big "starting over." We make resolutions, list of things we intend to do differently once we turn the calendar page. We have a respite from pessimism with the hope that "this year will be different." New Years is a place of new beginning. And as tired as I get working my way through Thanksgiving, Hanukkah, Solstice and Christmas, I still look forward to New Year's Eve: the threshold of the new year.

In New England, where I grew up, the time after the Winter Solstice is usually very quiet and still. In Maine, the ground would be frozen: solid! Squirrels and birds and deer would feed in the sunlight, and hunker down for warmth for the long nights. The air so cold no one was out and moving around. The ground was covered in thick blankets of snow. Earth was tucked in like a child with lots of quilts. It was a terrific time to think. The stillness made the evenings feel special, almost holy. There was a clarity in the cold air that encouraged reflection.

I find it harder to get to that deep place here in my adopted home of Florida. Where I live is sometimes called "The Gateway to the Tropics." Here, there is always something in motion. The ground gives forth motion and life year round. There is something flying, buzzing, crawling or slithering about day and night. Don't get me wrong, this isn't a bad thing! I love the fecundity of life here in Florida. It's just hard to find stillness with all this life and motion.

For me, part of the allure of the New Year is that time of stillness. Each year we almost stop the world, we pause. We suspend our calendar. We suspend our routines. We have a time of reflection and celebration. And we can step out on January 1st into a brand new year.

This year, I will build the stillness into my packed schedule. I will take a day to do nothing in the week between Christmas and New Year's Eve. Yes, I will schedule a whole day of no activities! Just rest, reflection, almost stillness. Maybe the beach? Somehow, the constant motion of the surf becomes a kind of stillness. I will take the day, find the stillness, and let myself consider the new year and it's promise.

It's not something I want to do each and every day. But this year, at the turn of the year, when 2006 ends and 2007 begins, you'll find me up and celebrating. I'll be ready to leave the dross of 2006 behind and step out into 2007 with new hope. Will you join me? Wishing you all a Gay and Healthy new year of Promise and Fulfillment.

In Our Past

Encyclopedia of Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, and Transgender History in America

For all of our wonderful readers who put at the top of their New Year Resolution List "to learn more about LGBT history", may I suggest that an easy place to start is with the wonderful three volume Encyclopedia of Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, and Transgender History in America.

You don't have to read all the entries in all three volumes, though you will want to, but simply dipping into one of the volumes will remind you how long and interesting our history is. LGBT folks have been around for all of human history and this encyclopedia, while certainly not able to be exhaustive, sure does a great job of filling in a number of the blanks in our past.

I'll give you a quick tour. Maybe your Valentine will want to purchase the set for you and then you can have our history available for the rest of the year!

Volume One covers "Actors to Gyms".

From the first entry on Actors you will realize that gay folks are indeed everywhere. From this historian's point of view, where it is impossible to have too many suggestions for other books to read, one of the best features of the encyclopedia is that each entry provides a bibliography. For instance, if acting is your passion and learning more about LGBT issues and acting is of interest, this entry provides you with additional sources such as Behind the Screen: How Gays and Lesbians Shaped Hollywood 1910-1969 (New York: Viking, 2001) or The Girls: Sappho Goes to Hollywood (New York: LA Weekly Books for St. Martins Griffin, 2000).

Volume One also contains entries on AIDS Service Organizations, Leonard Bernstein, Environmental and Ecology Movements and much much more.

Volume Two from "H.D. to Queer Theory".

Sigmund Freud analyzed H.D. in the 1930s and declared her "the perfect bi-," and later literary critics also located the "tensions in her work on a bisexual borderline". Both Oscar Wilde and Sappho were important to H.D. She identified with Wilde as a "decadent committed to the artistic personality." H.D. was close friends with other lesbian poets such as Amy Lowell and May Sarton in the United States and Sylvia Beach and Gertrude Stein in Paris. If modern poetry is one of your interests, you will eagerly read this entry on H.D.

In Volume Two the entry on "Music" runs from page 283 to 306 and covers Broadway and Musical

Theater, Rock and Roll and Androgyny, Opera and Popular Music which are only a few of the highlights. You might want to read the entry on "Pride Marches and Parades" before our 2007 Pride celebrations roll around.

Volume Three from "Race to Zulma"

The first entry in Volume Three reminds us that we still have plenty of work to do. The entry on "Race and Racism" speaks to the significance of these issues in our LGBT communities.

After the September 11, 2001 attack on the World Trade Center and the Pentagon, the Audre Lorde Project's Center for Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, Two Spirit, and Transgender People of Color Communities issued a statement condemning the scapegoating of people of color in the United States

Learning how to work collaboratively is central to all of LGBT's projects of justice. We can't ignore the challenges of race and racism and the damage they inflict.

The bibliography that accompanies this entry provides plenty of suggestions for how to continue the important work of understanding our differences so we can learn how to work together with respect and support.

Encyclopedia of Lesbian, Gay, bisexual, and Transgender History in America (Charles Scribner's Sons, 2004). This reference book is a comprehensive survey of the lesbian, gay, bisexual, and transgender experience in America from colonial times through the landmark 2003 Lawrence & Garner v. Texas Supreme Court case. The Encyclopedia examines the representation of LGBT issues in fields ranging from anthropology to American studies, from cultural studies to literature, and others: reveals histories of the growth of queer communities in America's cities, shows the treatments of specific LGBT issues such as health care and anti-discrimination laws; and includes biographies of notable writers, thinkers, activists, and artists. More than 200 illustrations show key personalities and documents from LGBT history.



*Harris, Rothenberg International, LLC, "The John Hancock 2005 Cost of Care Survey."

Last March, an Inlet Grove High School senior published an investigative report disclosing that while Palm Beach County's teachers and students were denied access to gay-supportive web sites such as GLSEN (www.glsen.org), Gay-Straight Alliance Network (www.gsanetwork. org) and PFLAG (www.pflag.org), they could easily access the anti-gay web sites of the Traditional Values Coalition, the American Family Association, and Focus on the Family from any School District computer. At the behest of PBHRC, Lambda Legal senior staff attorney Greg Nevins and ACLU of Florida Legal Director Randall Marshall worked with the School District to find a solution.
