Spiritually Speaking

Imagine you had everything: lots of money, designer clothes, fast cars, holidays abroad, friends, and fame—and then suddenly— you found that having all these things did not bring you happiness. If you can imagine this, then you can imagine something about St. Francis of Assisi. Francis had everything but the one thing he did not have was happiness.

Most people know that St. Francis was rich but became poor; that he gave up everything to follow God: and that he loved animals. The question is, how did he change, or more importantly, why? He himself says that the decisive moment came when he met a leper. Now, the lepers of St. Francis' time were treated much the same as the lepers of Jesus' time - everyone hated them, despised them, feared them. They were outcasts, what we would call today "non-people". St. Francis hated them too and could not bear the site or smell of them: they made him sick and he was afraid of catching their disease. There was a leprosarium iust outside his hometown of Assisi - and he used to travel three miles around the town in order to avoid passing it.

But things do not always work the way we plan. One day while riding, St. Francis got off his horse. Nothing strange about that, except he got off his horse so that he could embrace a leper! Yes, so that he could embrace a leper. So that he could actually take into his arms that thing he despised and hated most. Why would he do this? Sometimes it is hard to tell why we do anything, except to say that he was compelled to do it, he had to do it. He had to do it because his life was changing. There was a slow process of

change beginning in St Francis - and it began with this embrace of the leper.

We are the same, aren't we? We refuse to come out of our comfort zones to spread love and cheerfulness, especially to those so unlike us....Jesus said we are the light of the world—let us "brighten the corner where we are... As a child, I recall my great grandmother, as stern as Queen Victoria and so pro-British, although she was strictly Canadian. She sang an old hymn entitled: "Brighten the Corner Where You Are." That says it all. Wherever we are, we are to shine the light and brighten the darkness around us with God's all-redeeming love. We are the People of divine love.

We must learn to embrace life and be grateful and in return show God's love to those less fortunate. Thanksgiving should not be once a year! It is a way of life! St. Francis discovered that in finding gratefulness and meaning in life's surprises and life's horrors, his life became a thankful and productive channel of God's mercy. We too, can experience the same through the attitude of gratitude and when we do we shall brighten the corner in which we find ourselves-even those unlikely corners of life that we do not realize how our random acts of kindness influence and change people around us.

Oh, I suppose we are all thankful, in our own ways. We are thankful that we have family— spouse, jobs, parents, friends. We are happy for the circumstances in which we find ourselves. Such pleasant living, such good living. We are even thankful that we know Jesus, that we are Christians. I wonder sometimes if we

ever have realized from what we have been cured? Do we realize that God has liberated us from self-centeredness and egotism?

One day, a man went to visit a church. He got there early, parked his car and got out. Another car pulled up said. "I always park there! You took my place!" The visitor went inside for Sunday School, found an empty seat and sat down. A young lady from the church approached him and stated, "That's my seat! You took my place!" The visitor was somewhat distressed by this rude welcome, but said nothing. After Sunday School, the visitor went into the sanctuary and sat down. Another member walked up to him and said, "That's my pew! You took my place!" The visitor was even more troubled by this treatment, but still he said nothing.

Later as the congregation was praying for Christ to dwell among them, the visitor stood up, and suddenly his appearance began to change. Horrible scars became visible on his hands and on his sandaled feet. Someone from the congregation noticed him and called out, "What happened to you?" The visitor replied, as his hat became a crown of thorns, and a tear fell from his eye: "I, took your place."

We will be transformed only as we learn humility, compassion, and servant hood— to be all Jesus was and is...a light in the darkness, unafraid to brighten the corner, no matter what... ▼



In Our Past

One of the strengths of the LGBT community is the organizations and institutions we create. Wherever we are, LGBT folks find ways to let others know there are friends and allies around. This month *In Our Past* continues the history of organizations that have been central and critical to LGBT communities around the country and the world.

BOOKSTORES

Do you remember the first time you picked up a book that had a LGBT character/s in it? It was and is a thrilling event. Books by and about LGBT people are an indispensable component of our common culture. Books with LGBT people in them provide us with valuable information as well as providing critical sources for validation and growth as LGBT individuals and as people trying to build communities. LGBT bookstores have been a vital part of that process. In many cases, it was LGBT bookstores that made LGBT books available for the first time. LGBT bookstores often play another essential role, in that, in addition to selling books, thev often became de facto community centers, a space where LGBT people could find information about local LGBT events and organizations.

Before there could be LGBT bookstores, there had to be LGBT books. In the 1940s there was a significant proliferation of published works by and about LGBT people. Gay male authors, like, Gore Vidal, James Baldwin, and Truman Capote wrote literary novels with LGBT characters. During the Cold War era that followed World War II, their novels often did not reach a wide audience.

LGBT-themed literary works were

regularly refused shelf space by libraries, bookstores refused to stock them and with the exception of LGBT people in urban areas most LGBT people were unaware such works were written and published. Another problem were the ever-present obscenity laws. These laws allowed for the arrest and prosecution of publishers and sellers of LGBT-themed books.

By the late 1960s a confluence of events cleared the way for the opening of the first LGBT bookstore. By the late 1960s a LGBT readership existed, a body of work with LGBT themes existed, obscenity laws were no longer an obstacle and the sexual revolution was well underway.

Craig Rodwell made the most of this synergy and opened the first LGBT bookstore in the United States. The Oscar Wilde Memorial Bookshop opened in 1967 in New York City. Rodwell identified the shop as a space for LGBT people by placing in the bookstore's window a "Gay is Good" sticker. Underneath the sticker he placed a sign that read "A Bookshop for the Homophile Movement." The bookstore's original location was on Mercer Street while it later moved to Christopher Street in Greenwich Village. It was Craig Rodwell who organized a march in June 1970 to commemorate the first anniversary of the Stonewall Riots. This march gave birth to annual LGBT pride celebrations that continue to the present time in cities and towns across the world.

Thanks to the civil rights movement, which gave rise to the gay liberation, and lesbian feminist movements a broader political, cultural, and social analysis developed in which LGBT bookstores could operate.

Spurred by Rodwell's success with the Oscar Wilde Bookstore, gay men opened bookstores in Philadelphia (Jay's Place, 1969, Giovanni's Room, 1973), Washington, D.C. (Lambda Rising, 1974), Los Angeles (A Different Light, 1979) to name a few. These early bookstores catered largely to gay men, which led to routine complaints by lesbians. Lesbians found their way into the bookselling business through a separate path. Beginning in the 1970s, the second-wave of the women's rights movement gave rise to the development of feminist bookstores, the majority of which were owned and operated by lesbian feminists.

Feminist bookstores have been vital parts of the feminist and lesbian communities in which they are located. The first lesbian feminist bookstore was the Amazon Bookstore Cooperative, opened in Minneapolis, Minnesota, in 1970. It did not take long for other stores to follow. Common Language opened in Ann Arbor, Michigan, in 1972; and New Words in Cambridge, Massachusetts, Antigone in Tucson, Arizona, in 1973; and Charis Books and More in Atlanta, Georgia in 1974.

The large chain bookstores have noticed that there is a market for LGBT books and the prices they can offer often undercut the independent LGBT bookstore. But probably as long as there are LGBT people and LGBT books, there will be LGBT bookstores, places not only for buying a book but connecting with a community. \blacktriangledown

STUART—According to a story in the Scripps newspapers a last-minute city declaration has temporarily stopped the construction of any nightclub in town has drawn complaints from one building owner.

The "zoning in progress" declaration means that the city won't allow construction of any restaurant over 3,000 square feet, or nightclub of any size, until officials finish tinkering with development rules to address such establishments.

John Katsock owns a 16,000 square foot building on Dixie Highway north of the Roosevelt Bridge, a former racquetball club, who's new tenants want to build a Latin-themed gav nightclub and restaurant. Katsock has been talking to Stuart city officials since June about the club, to be called the Rainbow Room.

City Attorney Paul Nicoletti said he put the stop order declaration on the City Commission's agenda the day of the meeting because he heard about another impending application, for a country line-dancing club, at the former Wal-Mart on U.S. 1 and Indian Street.

City officials want to be able to put tighter regulations on clubs and large restaurants— 3.000 square feet is about the size of a fast food restaurant-to reduce future problems with police calls, fire service, and noise, Nicoletti said. Officials want to ensure sites have enough parking, lighting, security and fire access, as well as addressing ways to dampen sound.

"We don't have appropriate zoning codes for those uses," he said.

Katsock said the city was discriminating against his clients, who are gay.

"They (city officials) are looking for every way to blow this out so it doesn't come into town." he said.

When asked about whether city staff were discriminating against the club because of the sexual orientation of the agents or clientele, Nicoletti said, "No. No. No. I don't think we really care. The city is not interested in the type of specific customers. We don't regulate specific uses."

Katsock, who said his tenants would put close to \$1 million of improvements into his building, said the declaration was "denying us the use of the property."

BRANDON-On September 20th . Equality Florida, along with a coalition of faith groups, social justice organizations and local community leaders, hosted nearly 100 demonstrators who came out to express the community's outrage over an anti-gay summit being hosted by at Bell Shoals Baptist Church.

The summit, disguised as a familyfriendly conference, was targeted toward teachers, parents, students and school administrators and included seminars such as "Homosexuality and Youth" and the "Homosexual Agenda."

Many Equality Florida supporters who were unable to attend the midday protest expressed their outrage by contributing a dollar or more for each workshop and presentation given during the anti-LGBT conference.

In just two short days, \$3,450 was raised to support the Florida GSA Network, a project designed to provide additional support and resources to Florida GSA student clubs. It is Florida's public school students who most often bare the brunt of the poison spewed at these summits.

Last year, Bell Shoals led a failed but disruptive and mean-spirited campaign to shut down the Hillsborough Gay-Straight Alliances (GSAs). They were also strong backers of former County Commissioner Ronda Storms, who infamously led the passage of a policy banning county agencies from recognizing Gav Pride.

TAMPA—The annual Tampa International Gay and Lesbian Film Festival will ring in next vear's festivities with a new name: the Clip Film Festival. The change was announced during the closing night of the 2007 festival as an effort to widen audience appeal, according to a press release from the group.

The new name "took a leap of faith in its simplicity," said Christopher Constantinou, Friends of the Festival Inc. president. It was settled upon because focus groups overwhelmingly felt that it "reflects a persona of a friend, something [people] wanted around."

The name change had been under consideration for many years, and the final decision came down to a vote by the board of directors last year. "We realized we needed more than a name -- we needed a brand, something that can represent the qualities of diversity, inclusion, and community," Constantinou said in the statement.

Although "gay" and "lesbian" have been removed from the title, audiences are assured the festival, which includes a yearround film outreach series, will continue to focus on LGBT issues.

MIAMI—The Miami Herald profiled a young man who found himself in the foster care system when he was about 13-years-old after his mother rejected him because he is gay. He experienced several dozen foster care facilities in which adults couldn't relate to him and other children could be brutal.

By the time the boy found a gay foster parent in Fort Lauderdale, he was a 17-year-old dropout addicted to drugs. He credits his foster father with turning his life around and taking him to Narcotics Anonymous. Many gay foster teenagers never find a good home.

Recognizing the gap in service. Broward County's foster care agency, ChildNet, has contracted with the National Youth Advocate Program (NYAP) to recruit and train foster parents to take in GLBT foster children.

Although Florida bans gay adults from adopting, the state does allow them to take in foster children.

During the past five years, gay rights and

child welfare groups have researched the experience of gay foster youth. What they found was horrific.

"Adults would say, 'If you weren't gay, you wouldn't get beat up'," said Flor Bermudez, an attorney for Lambda Legal in New York. "Or they would be placed in very religious foster homes where foster parents would take away their clothes . . . and have them go to church every Sunday so they would

"Sometimes social workers know a child is gay but don't tell the foster family," said Rob Woronoff, a consultant and former GLBT director of the Child Welfare League of America. "A kid comes out, and the foster parents say. 'Nobody told us this kid was gav." he said.

Things are going well for the young man and his foster dad. "For Father's Day, he sent me a card," Dad said. "He said it was the first time he had the chance to send a Father's Day present."

NEW YORK-J.K. Rowling, author of the mega-selling fantasy series that ended last summer, outed a beloved character Friday night while appearing before a full house at Carnegie Hall. After reading briefly from the final book, "Harry Potter and the Deathly Hallows," she took questions from audience

She was asked by one young fan whether Dumbledore finds "true love."

"Dumbledore is gay," the author responded to gasps and applause.

She then explained that Dumbledore was smitten with rival Gellert Grindelwald. whom he defeated long ago in a battle between good and bad wizards. "Falling in love can blind us to an extent," Rowling said of Dumbledore's feelings, adding that Dumbledore was "horribly, terribly let down."

Dumbledore's love, she observed, was his "great tragedy."

Potter readers on fan sites and elsewhere on the Internet have speculated on the sexuality of Dumbledore, noting that he has no close relationship with women and a mysterious. troubled past. And explicit scenes with Dumbledore already have appeared in fan

Rowling told the audience that while working on the planned sixth Potter film, "Harry Potter and the Half-Blood Prince," she spotted a reference in the script to a girl who once was of interest to Dumbledore. A note was duly passed to director David Yates, revealing the truth about her character.

Rowling, finishing a brief "Open Book Tour" of the United States, her first tour here since 2000, also said that she regarded her Potter books as a "prolonged argument for tolerance" and urged her fans to "question authority."

Not everyone likes her work, Rowling said, likely referring to Christian groups that have alleged the books promote witchcraft. Her news about Dumbledore, she said, will give them one more reason.

WASHINGTON, DC—According to an article in *The Blade*, The Employment Non-Discrimination Act (ENDA) cleared a pivotal hurdle in committee after four gay-supportive Republicans joined the Democratic majority to save the bill from defeat.

Four pro-gay Democrats, including presidential candidate Dennis Kucinich (D-Ohio), voted against the bill, saying they did so because a provision protecting transgender persons had been removed.

The bill passed in the House Committee on Education and Labor by a vote of 27 to 21, with 23 Democrats and four Republicans voting for the measure, which calls for banning job discrimination based on sexual orientation, a category that includes gay men, lesbians and bisexuals. Seventeen Republicans and the four Democrats voted against the bill.

The Democrats voting against the bill in committee joined the Democratic majority in voting against four Republican-proposed amendments that Democrats said were aimed at weakening or gutting the bill.

The four Republicans who voted for the bill were Reps. Michael Castle (R-Del.), Judy Biggert (R-III.), Todd Platts (R-Penn.) and Randy Kuhl (R-N.Y.).

The decision by Kucinich and his three Democratic colleagues to vote against the

sexual orientation-only version of ENDA in committee comes at a time when a coalition of more than 300 national and state gay and transgender advocacy groups is calling on Congress to oppose any version of the bill that excludes transgender protection.

Speaker of the House Nancy Pelosi (D-Calif.) and House Democratic leaders decided to advance a sexual orientation-only version of the bill after determining there were not enough votes to pass a trans-inclusive bill. Pelosi said most House Democrats prefer to pass a more limited version of the bill this year.

Rep. Tammy Baldwin (D-Wisc.), the only open lesbian in Congress, has secured permission from Pelosi to introduce an amendment on the House floor to restore transgender protections in ENDA.

It is feared, however, that if a transgender vote loses by a wide margin, it would make it more difficult to pass a trans-inclusive bill in the next few years because those who vote against it would be reluctant to change their votes.

Mara Keisling, executive director of the National Center for Tansgender Equality, said the large coalition of groups opposed to a sexual orientation-only bill would continue to lobby for a fully inclusive version of the legislation.

Keisling reiterated her longstanding view that no version of ENDA is going to pass in Congress this year due to an expected veto by President Bush. She said ENDA supporters should hold off a vote on the bill until enough support exists for passing a trans-inclusive bill.

Two of the Republican-proposed amendments introduced in committee called for broadening the bill's religious exemption. Another called for removing a provision in the bill that bans discrimination based on marital status and the fourth called for removing a provision that bans job discrimination based on someone's "perceived" sexual orientation.

WASHINGTON, DC—On September 27th, the US Senate moved the Matthew Shepard Hate Prevention Crimes Act forward, without a single vote to spare. Florida Senator Nelson's "Yes" vote proved critical to moving



the bill, as the bipartisan support reached 60 votes, the minimum required to accept cloture which ended debate on the bill. The entire Senate then moved to approve the legislation by a voice vote - attaching it as an amendment to the Fiscal Year 2008 Department of Defense Authorization bill.

Over 3,500 Equality Florida supporters contacted Senators Nelson and Martinez to demand support for this critically important legislation.

PENTAGON—According to PinkNews.co.uk the American Armed Forces placed job ads on a gay networking site despite the fact that people who are openly gay, bisexual or lesbian are banned from serving.

A spokesman for the Army National Guard told *USA Today* he was unaware of the adverts running on GLEE.com

The Navy has ordered that 8,000 ads be removed from the site. The Marine Corps claimed that only civilian jobs, not covered by the "Don't Ask Don't Tell" policy were advertised.

"This is the first I've heard about it," Major Michael Baptista, advertising branch chief for the Army National Guard, told USA Today.

"We didn't knowingly advertise on that particular website."

The US Armed Forces are undergoing a recruitment crisis. Figures released by the Pentagon show that they are resorting to accepting thousands of convicted criminals into their ranks.

The Army and others have been forced to lower their standards, while continuing to discharge hundreds of personnel for being gay, lesbian or bisexual.

Last year 8,129 "moral waivers" were granted – a mechanism that allows someone with a criminal record to enlist in the military.

They represent a tenth of new recruits in 2006. The US military has already raised the maximum enlistment age and dropped the basic educational standards required of recruits.

In 1992 President Bill Clinton promised to open the military to openly gay and lesbian people during his successful campaign for President, but caved into pressure from the Army - the compromise was the current policy of Don't Ask Don't Tell.

It means gay, bisexual or lesbians can serve in the Armed Forces as long as they conceal their orientation.

Recently a former Army general who was chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff in the US called for a change in attitude towards gay and lesbian soldiers, as did former Defense Secretary William Cohen.

Among those unhappy with the policy is New York congressman Gary Ackerman.

"For some reason, the military seems more afraid of gay people than they are (of) terrorists, but they're very brave with the terrorists," he said.

"If the terrorists ever got hold of this information, they'd get a platoon of lesbians to chase us out of Baghdad."

The US military has discharged over 11,000 personnel for being gay or lesbian since 1993.
