The Family of God Community Church has gone through a change of leadership before and shown that it is strong enough to survive and grow. And they are in much better shape now than when Mark came in.



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

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## Spiritually Speaking

Everyone's life is driven by something. The verb drive is defined as "to guide, to control, or to direct." What is the driving force in your life? Many of us are driven by a problem, a pressure, or a deadline. Some are driven by a painful memory, a haunting fear, or an unconscious belief. There are hundreds of circumstances, values, and emotions that can drive our lives. Five of the most common drivers in our lives are:

Some people are driven by guilt. They spend their entire lives running from regrets and hiding their shame. Guilt-driven people are manipulated by memories. They allow their past to control their future. They often punish themselves by sabotaging their own success. They wander through life without a purpose. We are the products of our past, but we don't have to be prisoners to our past.

Some people are driven by resentment and anger. People hold on to hurts and never get over them. Instead of releasing their pain through forgiveness, they rehearse it over and over in their minds. They keep on playing the same old tapes over and over. Some people "clam up" and internalize their anger while others "blow up" and explode it onto others. Both responses are unhealthy and unhelpful.

Resentment always hurts you more than it does the person you resent. While your offender has probably forgotten the offense and gone on with life, we often continue to stew in our pain, perpetuating the past. Those who have hurt you in the past cannot continue to hurt you now unless you hold on to the pain through resentment. Our past is past. Nothing will change it. We only hurt ourselves with our bitterness. We should learn from our pasts and then let it go.

Some people are driven by fear. These fears may be a result of a traumatic experience, unrealistic expectations, growing up in a high-control home, or even a genetic predisposition. Regardless of the cause, fear-driven people often miss great opportunities because they're afraid to venture out. Instead, they play it safe, avoiding risks, and trying to maintain the status quo. Fear is a self-imposed prison that will keep us from becoming what God intends for us to be. We must move against it with the weapons of faith and love.

Manypeoplearedrivenbymaterialism. Their desire to acquire becomes the entire goal of their lives. This drive to always want more is based on the misconceptions that having more will make one more happy, more important, and more secure, but all three ideas are untrue. Possessions only provide temporary happiness. Because things do not change, we eventually become bored with them and then want newer, bigger, better versions.

It is a myth that if I get more, I will be



more important. Self-worth and net worth are not the same. Your value is not determined by your valuables. God says the most valuable things in life are not things.

The most common myth about money is that having more will make me more secure. It won't. The more one has, the more fear one develops that they will lose their wealth. They invest in more burglar alarms, security systems, weapons, and even security guards. Wealth can be lost instantly through a variety of uncontrollable factors. Real security can only be found in that which can never be taken from you — your relationship with God.

Many people today are driven by the need for approval. We allow the expectations of parents or partners or teachers or friends to control our lives. Many adults are still trying to earn the approval of unpleasable parents. Others are driven by peer pressure, always worried by what others might think. Look how many TV shows we have that try to teach us to dress according to the opinions of others. Those who follow the crowd usually get lost in it.

We might not know all the keys to

success. I do know that the number key to failure is trying to please everyone. Being controlled by the opinions of others is a guaranteed way to miss God's purposes for your life.

There are other forces that can drive our lives, but they all lead to the same dead end: unused potential, unnessary stress, and an unfulfilled life. We need to discover how to live a life filled with purpose – a life guided, controlled, and directed and God's purposes. Without a purpose, life is motion without meaning, activity without direction, and events without reason. Without a purpose, life is trivial, petty, and pointless. ightlefty

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# In My Words a personal viewpoint

#### Keeping on Keeping on

In high school I was involved in various clubs, the Mayor's Youth Advisory Council, Order of the Arrow, etc. Sometimes I was a follower, sometimes a leader. In college I was rush chairman and an officer of my fraternity. After college I had moved to Chicago and wanted to meet gay people. Not being a party-boy, I figured that I would volunteer at Gay Horizons, the social service agency and meet people that way.

I was welcomed and put to work on the switchboard program answering the help line at 929-HELP. You can't imagine what it was like in 1975 to spend 4 hours a night, several times a week, answering a phone by saying, "Good evening, Gay Horizons, how may I help you?" Even today I think most GLBT people would have to take a deep breath before answering the phone with the G word. It was liberating in a very personal way. You learned that most of the time the people on the other end were relieved to reach someone who was gay and open about it. We answered around 10,000 calls a year and most of them were bar referrals (this was Chicago and so you quickly learned which bars were neighborhood, dance, leather, women's, drag, western, suburban, etc.). We also had several thousand hang-ups each year. It would be years afterward when I would meet people who would relate that they had called and couldn't bring themselves to speak and hung up. After several calls they could finally speak, but it was crucial to their coming out that they heard someone say the G word. Often these callers would end up in a coming out group.

But I was only a switchboard volunteer for two weeks. I was elected Chairperson! I didn't stop volunteering but took on the additional responsibilities. It was a difficult time for Gay Horizons as Howard Brown Health Clinic had just broken away (at that time Howard Brown was an STD clinic as this was pre-AIDS). Howard Brown had a revenue stream from their clinic and Gay Horizons had the help line, counseling and a youth group. Howard Brown had income and Gay Horizons had expenses. There had been a difficult split over the medical clinic supporting the social work. So the new board was presented with months of arrears on the rent and phone bills.

We initiated fund raising and were modestly successful in raising money and were able to pay off all our arrears in a couple of months. Just as everything seemed to be succeeding disaster struck: there was a fire in the electrical distribution closet and we had to close.

Now was a time of decision for the board: what would we do? We had a few hundred dollars and no place to operate. We were all stressed from what we had just gone through, now we looked at the huge task of finding a new location. The question was posed to the board, "Do we go on, or

do we just close up?"

It was decided to go on. This meant that everyone on the board and the head of the counseling service pledged to do whatever it took to find a new space and keep Gay Horizons alive. The phone line was forwarded to a north side group called the Rogers Park Gay Center, counselors held session at their homes and the youth group had to stop as there was no place for them to meet.

Joe Loundy, the head of the counseling group and I looked and looked and argued and argued. We had had three rooms now we could only afford one sub-basement room. Eventually we rented it and built a partition for counseling. Joe was never pleased, as it was too noisy for counseling sessions, especially when there were social activities going on in the center, especially the bridge club! And the constant phone ringing was disturbing as well. Unfortunately the youth group did not reform as they felt it was necessary to have a private room to meet in.

So the following year Joe ran for Chairperson and won. I took a few months off then returned to answering phones. Joe stayed on for 9 years leading Gay Horizons through incredible growth: a new home, a peak of 19 programs – including Gerber-Hart Resource Center and Library, which eventually went on to be a separate organization and is now a leading GLBT library and archive. I served as co-director of switchboard (as the phone line was called), PR chair and peer counselor through my 10 year association.

Gay Horizons, after Joe left, dropped the Gay and became Horizons Social Services and moved away from the gay area, gained many grants and became a professionally staffed organization. It is now known as The Center on Halsted and last June moved into a 20 million dollar home.

So when times are hard and difficult decision have to be made it doesn't have to be the end of an organization. With perseverance and community support the organization can go on, start over and grow to unbelievable success. It means that when there are disagreements about how things are done, when there are personality conflicts, that the answer is to work things through, to step up and provide answers and show a willingness to lead in a different direction.

It's 30 years later, but I find myself in similar circumstances with The Living Room. Based on my past experience this is far from the end, but actually represents a new beginning. How it will turn out depends on whether professional level members of our community are willing to step forward and get involved or not. One thing is for sure: The Living Room will produce Space Coast Pride 2008 on May 25 at Wickham Pavilion. I hope to see you there although I'd love to see you at one of our board meetings volunteering to work on funding or programming or coordinating volunteers or whatever you can do to help build your community center.


Oh, and the area code has changed from 312 to 773 but you can still dial 929-HELP (4357) to get help in Chicago although they don't answer with the G word today. ▼

WASHINGTON-Friday, January 25, Rep. Dr. Dave Weldon, R 15, announced he would be retiring after serving seven terms as one of the most conservative of Florida's Congressional delegation. Speculation was rife as the announcement came the day after Katherine Weldon, Rep. Weldon's daughter was arrested at County Line Bar in Melbourne for an alleged unprovoked attack on security guard with a high heel shoe. Weldon's seat had been targeted by Democrats in this election cycle.

BREVARD-Steve Blythe, Democrat, has been running for Congress Florida's 15th District. Now that Weldon is out of the race he will be involved in a race against an opponent without a Congressional record and perhaps an opponent in a primary as well. Blythe has met with this magazine and is not afraid of gay people and when talking about moral values does not mean discrimination against GLBT people.

Blvthe's web site describes him as a "Melbourne Family Physician... running to represent the people of Florida's 15th District in the US Congress. Steve is not a slick politician or party insider - he never dreamed of going into politics. He is simply a capable, smart, sincere, concerned American - concerned about the future his children - and vours. TALAHASSEE—Equality Florida has called the 2008 Legislative Session historic.

"Over the last several months, Equality Florida has worked with our legislative champions to introduce bills that, when passed, will provide much needed benefits and protections to millions of Floridians. To support the effort, Equality Florida is planning our first-ever Lobby Week, beginning March 17.

"March 17 & 18 - Safe Schools Lobby Day. March 19 & 20 - Adoption Lobby Day, March 20 - Civil Rights Lobby Day (tentative date)."

The legislation includes Safe Schools, Adoption, Equal Rights, State Employee Domestic Partner Registry and Florida Companion Registry.

TALAHASSEE-A Palm Beach county Human Rights Council news release announced that Florida Attorney General Bill McCollum's Office has implemented a policy that allows his employees to use sick leave to care for their domestic partners.

"With this pro-family policy, Attorney General McCollum has become the second constitutional officer in Florida history to recognize the needs of non-traditional families," said Rand Hoch, President of the Palm Beach County Human Rights Council.

The Palm Beach County Human Rights Council is a non-profit organization that has been in the forefront of domestic partnership issues in Florida for more than 15 years."

At the Council's request, Florida CFO Alex Sink instituted a policy permitting her office's employees to use sick leave to care for domestic partners.

On October 17, shortly after Sink's policy went into effect, Hoch wrote to Attornev General McCollum asking him to consider implementing a similar policy.

By letter dated December 17, Cathy Christensen. McCollum's Human Resources Administrator, notified the Hoch that the Attorney General's sick leave policy would not specifically address domestic partners per se, it would "provide enough latitude" for employees to use their sick leave to care for their domestic partners."

Palm Beach County Human Rights Council has not yet heard from Agriculture and Consumer Services Commissioner Charles Bronson, who also was asked to revise his office's policy.

WEST PALM BEACH—Compass received the Martin Luther King, Jr. Organization Leadership Award at Palm Beach Community College's 9th Annual Dr. Martin Luther King. Jr. Celebration Breakfast on January 17, 2008 among more than 600 attendees to the event.

The event's keynote speaker was Nikki Giovanni, author, professor and activist. Ms. Giovanni spoke for more than twenty minutes to the crowd. With her dynamic personality she connected to the audience speaking about the effects of racism, the accomplishments and challenges to black women and mothers, and chastised some black leaders for being too divisive. Ms. Giovanni also strongly voiced her opinion in support of gav marriage which drew a large applause from the audience.

WASHINGTON— According to a press release from the American Psychological Association "New research finds equal level of commitment and relationship satisfaction among same-sex and heterosexual couples." The press release states:

Same-sex couples are just as committed in their romantic relationships as heterosexual couples, say researchers who have studied the quality of adult relationships and healthy development. Their finding disputes the stereotype that couples in same-sex relationships are not as committed as their heterosexual counterparts and are therefore not as psychologically healthy.

These results are from two studies featured in the January issue of Developmental Psychology, published by the American Psychological Association. This issue includes a special section that examines sexual orientation across the lifespan.

Both studies compared same-sex couples with opposite-sex couples on a number of developmental and relationship factors. The first study examined whether committed same-sex couples differ from engaged and married opposite-sex couples in how well they interacted and how satisfied they were with their partners. Evidence has shown that positive interactions improve the quality of relationships in ways that foster healthy adult development.

Researchers from the University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign compared 30 committed gay male and 30 committed lesbian couples with 50 engaged heterosexual couples and 40 older married heterosexual couples, as well as with dating heterosexual couples. All the partners responded to a questionnaire that documented how positively they interacted with one another on a day to day basis. The couples were also observed during a laboratory task and were monitored for distress by skin conductance and heart

Results showed that same-sex relationships were similar to those of opposite-sex couples in many ways. All had positive views

of their relationships but those in the more committed relationships (gay and straight) resolved conflict better than the heterosexual dating couples. And lesbian couples worked together especially harmoniously during the laboratory tasks.

The notion that committed same-sex relationships are "atypical, psychologically immature, or malevolent contexts of development was not supported by our findings," said lead author Glenn I. Roisman, PhD. "Compared with married individuals, committed gay males and lesbians were not less satisfied with their relationships."

Furthermore, said Roisman, "Gay males and lesbians in this study were generally not different from their committed heterosexual counterparts on how well they interacted with one another, although some evidence emerged the lesbian couples were especially effective at resolving conflict."

In the second study, researchers from the University of Washington, San Diego State University and the University of Vermont wanted to examine how sexual orientation and legal status affected relationship quality. To do so, they followed 65 male and 138 female same-sex couples with civil unions, 23 male and 61 female same-sex couples not in civil unions and 55 heterosexual married couples over a three-year period. One member of each heterosexual couple was a sibling to a member of a civil union couple.

The researchers found that same-sex couples were similar to heterosexual couples on most relationships variables, and that the legalized status of a relationship did not seem to be the overriding factor affecting

same-sex relationships.

Despite the legal status of their relationships, the civil union couples showed no differences on any of the relationship measures from the same-sex couples who were in committed relationships but not in civil unions. "This may be because those couples in Vermont who sought out the legal protection of a civil union might have legalized their relationship more for symbolic value than for commitment reasons, which did not affect their day-to-day interactions," said lead author Kimberly F. Balsam. PhD.

However, the same sex-couples who were not in civil unions were more likely to have ended their relationships compared to those couples in same-sex civil unions or heterosexual marriages. This suggests that the protections afforded by a legalized relationship may impact same-sex relationships, something the study's authors plan to follow up on in future research, said Balsam.

The findings also showed that same-sex couples, regardless of civil union status, were more satisfied with their relationships compared to married heterosexual couples. Same-sex couples reported more positive feelings toward their partners and less conflict than heterosexual married couples, said the authors.

This was the first study to follow samesex couples in legalized unions over a period of time. This type of design allows the researchers to monitor changes in the relationships and compare them with changes experienced by both same-sex couples not in civil unions and heterosexual couples. All the couples were comparable with respect to race/ethnicity and age at the time of the study.

CENTRAL PA—As reported by The Patriot-News reporter Carrie Cassidy, the plight of a gay teen moved a school to act.

"The teenager, an openly gay boy described by friends as kind and compassionate, said he was constantly harassed, though he never reported it to anyone, not even his friends.

"Finally, when classmates told him to 'go kill himself' to 'make the world a better place,' the teen decided he'd had enough. He said he left school in the middle of his senior year because he could no longer bear the torment.

"His departure inspired a petition by about 300 of his classmates calling for district administrators to prevent the same thing from happening to others.

"After talking extensively with the boy, his mother and an advocate for the family and with the school's Gay Straight Alliance group, Superintendent David Volkman put together a group to examine everything from the teaching of tolerance to changing policies."

"I think the petition ... speaks volumes about this student and about the majority of students in this school,' Volkman said. 'This is a pretty big issue, and it's an important one that we need to start talking about.'

"Meanwhile, administrators developed a plan for him to graduate that was acceptable to his family and to the boy, and he will be able to attend the prom and graduate. But Volkman said he knows the student is missing out."

HOLLYWOOD, CA—Singer Cher and her lesbian daughter Chastity Bono are to cohost a new reality television show aimed at helping people to come out of the closet, according to a report published in the UK.

Chastity, whose late father Sonny Bono was Cher's husband and musical collaborator and a former member of the US House of Representatives, is a leading LGBT rights activist

She was outed by a tabloid newspaper in 1990 when she was 21 years old and initially denied her sexuality.

Cher reportedly "went ballistic" when her daughter came out to her.

Despite her initial reaction, Cher has become supportive of Chastity, and in the show 'Coming Out With Cher and Chas they will help gay and lesbian people come out to friends and family.

NEPAL—Nepal's top court has ruled that the government must create new laws to protect gay rights and change current ones that might be tantamount to discrimination.

The Nepalese Supreme Court was acting on a petition by gay activists. It will be up to the government to figure out how to implement the ruling.

MONTEVIDEO—On January first, Uruguay became the first Latin American country to recognize gay civil unions, after President Vazquez signed a law granting certain legal rights to cohabiting couples of any gender.

The new law guarantees heterosexual or homosexual couples who have lived together continuously for more than five years social benefits enjoyed by married couples such as joint property ownership and hereditary rights.
