





Not all, as once again they took a respectable amount from the **Space Coast Pride** receipts and distributed it to PFLAG Melbourne and NOW as well as Project Response. Organizations that work for our community would do themselves a favor if they attended board meetings and events, wink, wink, nudge, nudge....

Gay Skate is back! Due to popular demand **The Living Room** is putting on another one on August 29th at Galaxy Skateway. If you really want this to be a regular thing you need to turn out – the cost of putting on a skating event is significantly more than, say bowling, so everyone who wants to see **Gay Skate** happen more often needs to be there (besides it's more fun since we have the whole place to ourselves).

Emerald City's opening had a great turn out. Seems like everyone came out to see the new bar and enjoy the music and shows. And **Emerald City** is continuing events with something every week, starting the month off with a blackout party.

Ultra Lounge events have been quite successful from their pajama party to the Drama Club reunion after party and they're doing two big events in August, ending with a blackout party.

Hmmmm. That leaves the middle of the month – seems everyone thought that August in glowing terms, including **Cold Keg** with their Glow party on the 22nd. Spiritually Speaking

Pass it on!

Whether you view summer as a time of out door fun, a time to travel, or a time to stay out of the heat with a good book, the fact is it's here! The celebrations of pride are past for the year and we have moved into our summer routine. For many of us that will include worship at a church of our choice. The good news is that the choices are becoming more positive. Yet there is still much to be done.

There was a time when openly Gav Christians had to expect to be scorned and censored in every mainstream Christian denomination. Our only choice was to minister to one another in churches whose primary ministry was to GLBT individuals and their families/ friends. MCC blazed a path, and in the 70's and 80's other gay friendly community churches began to offer alternatives. Still the verdict was grim from the denominational churches where most of us grew up.

In the 80's there were some support groups beginning to form within those churches, but they were largely outside the denominational structure. These renegade gay Christian support groups added their voice to the controversy that was being generated by the community churches which serve our community. Because of the faithfulness of those who left to form gay-friendly ministries: and the faithfulness of those who stayed in their denominational homes to maintain the vigil and fight the battles, the controversies eventually began to demand the attention of denominational leaders.

It has taken 3 decades of turmoil

within even the most progressive denominations, before there has been much visible acceptance of GLBT people in ministry or in the sacraments. Forty years ago it is questionable whether any traditional Christian Church would offer Christian burial to an openly Gay man or Lesbian. Our people were quietly sent to their graves without the celebrations which affirm eternal life. They were prayed over like the black sheep who had gone astray to the shame of their family. How disgusting it was to attend the grave side ceremony of a friend, where his name was never spoken. Only the grief of the family was acknowledged, never the life or death of the deceased!


We have come a long way, but still there are mighty few denominational churches who will celebrate our unions. Ministers who are willing to affirm our unions still do so outside local church sanctuaries, and surrounded by controversy.

There is much work still to be done. Respectful celebrations of eternal life, affirmation of our unions, ordination of our ministers, and full participation in church leadership are still elusive experiences for Gay people in denominational churches. They are available in our community ministries. But too often we leave the work of ministry to others.

It's time for us to take the next step of responsibility in our life as a community. Our service to the church must be more than to call it to be the light of Christ for us too! Each of us can find a place to serve in the church of our choice. Whether it is to take up the vigil and raise

the consciousness in the denominational struggles to become more inclusive; or whether it be to support a ministry outreach to gay's within our community, we need to step up.

We are the next generation of gay Christians. It is not enough that we know that God loves us. We must perpetuate that understanding in our community and in our churches in positive ways. It is not OK that there are still Christians who teach our sisters and brothers that they have to be straight to be acceptable to God. It is not OK that there are still preachers telling our friends that they are doomed to hell. We cannot leave the job half done.

As the first generation of gay activists, and the first generation of openly gay and lesbian Christians are passing on to eternal life, we must do more than honor them with our words, we must do their work. We must remain in the churches and speak out in our communities of the spiritual heritage which is ours. God loves us. No one can ever take that away from us, because we have experienced it! Pass it on!





Come Out, Come Out Wherever You

The enshrining of bigotry in the laws of the State of California regarding samesex marriage has been discussed, debated, excused and fought. It has had the benefit of opinion by the famous and by the man on the street. It has made history in a most shameful way, being the first time a minority has lost rights due to the popular vote of the majority. It has been the subject of reams of newscopy, it was an occurrence that should cause any California voter who cast a ballot that helped foster this disgrace, to hang his/her head in shame.

Equally shameful, less mourned and maybe even more oppressive was the majority choice in the State of Florida to alter the State Constitution to insert the definition of marriage to be between one man and one woman. We need to become known to our parents, our siblings, all of our relatives, our teachers, our co-workers and our friends. It is time.


The tactic used in Mr. Milk's campaigns in California defeated the anti-gay hate sweeping across the nation that was engendered by Anita Bryant and in

California by the politically opportunistic Senator Briggs, and secured the rights of gay people in the California of the 70's. The tactic also helped secure the election of Harvey Milk as a Supervisor (Councilman) in the San Francisco city government.

His theory was that if parents, friends etc. knew who their vote was hurting, they would be less likely to vote that way. It makes good sense actually ... and it has worked. Does this mean there would be no risk? Decidedly not. In the United States we live in a moralistic culture. The oddity is that so many of those who wear their morality on their shirt fronts, so many of those who preach so-called family values with its anti-gay rhetoric are as phony as three dollar bills. We live in times where few if any of us have secrets, and the indiscretions (or worse) of these people becomes public knowledge. Look at the past few years and see the sexual "sins" of Senators, Congressmen, Governors. Preachers. Priests and teachers who have been held up by themselves and by others as veritable paragons of morality. These people who forgot that only those without sin could cast the first stone, and vet they threw stone after stone. Their favorite target seemed to be those of us in the LGBT Community.

from behind the closet doors that have

been created for us by a society that is out-moded and doesn't know it as yet, if we make it a priority to let those who love us know that we are gay, and to let the community at large know that among us are doctors, lawyers, nurses, teachers, politicians. mechanics, scientists, factory workers, office workers, waitpersons, sales people, etc. We are everywhere and we are legion. Florida needs to know this. Every state where we are oppressed needs to know this. We need to be registered to vote.... we need to influence our friends to register. We need to show who we are in the community. We need to make our families know what effect their votes have on us. We need to do all we can so that no other initiative that hurts gay people or diminishes their rights can ever pass at the ballot box again.



MIAMI—The judge who ruled in November 2008 that the state's ban on adoption by gay couples – in existence since the days of Anita Bryant – is unconstitutional has been demoted from her position on the Miami-Dade circuit court.

The new Chief Justice of Miami's courts, Orlando Prescott, ended the 15-year tenure of the top administrative judge over Miami-Dade's juvenile courts allegedly to provide new perspectives and leadership for the position.

Her honor's, Cindy Lederman, November ruling may lead to the end of Florida's ban on adoption by same-sex couple. The case is on appeal, with the state of Florida preparing to defend the ban.

Judge Lederman, who will now serve as a juvenile court judge, says she respects Prescott's decision.

ANAHEIM, CA—A July 15 story in the Irish Examiner explained that Episcopalians in the US declared gays and lesbians eligible for "any ordained ministry", a vote expected to upset world Anglican leaders who had sought a clear moratorium on consecrating another gay bishop.

Leaders of the Episcopal Church, the Anglican province in the United States, insisted they were still committed to membership in the Anglican Communion.

Some Anglican leaders, however, predicted the vote would break their fellowship.

The Episcopal General Convention, meeting in Anaheim, California, gave final approval to the measure during their once-every-three-years legislative assembly.

"God has called and may call" gays in committed relationships to "any ordained ministry" in the church, the resolution said.

Lay people voted 78-21 and clergy voted 77-19 to approve the measure. The House

of Bishops had earlier voted 99-45 to adopt the statement. In the debates, delegates said they worried about the reaction of other Anglicans, but felt a duty to vote ves.

Episcopalians caused an uproar in 2003 by consecrating the first openly gay bishop, Gene Robinson of New Hampshire. Since then, Archbishop of Canterbury Rowan Williams, the Anglican spiritual leader, has struggled to prevent a permanent Anglican split

Last month, breakaway Episcopal conservatives and other like-minded traditionalists formed a rival national province to the Episcopal Church called the Anglican Church in North America.

The new body includes four seceding Episcopal dioceses and is supported by several overseas Anglican leaders who have broken ties with the Episcopal Church.

The 77 million-member communion is the third-largest grouping of churches worldwide, behind the Roman Catholic and Orthodox Christian churches.

Additionally, LezGetReal, reported on July 18 that the Episcopal Church has asked their scholars to begin researching the creation of a same-sex union prayer for ceremonies blessing same-sex unions. Any such prayer would be presented at the next convention, in 2012.

Currently there is no specific blessing in the Episcopal Church for services blessing same-sex unions or marriages so the churches that currently celebrate them rely on blessings from the normal run of prayers.

Debate took into consideration that this action may drive the conservative faction within the church further away.

"Our policy does include gay and lesbian spouses, wherever they were married. Whether in other states or countries, they qualify."

AAA South management says it will take about 2 weeks to train 3,000 staff members to implement the policy uniformly.

Same-sex couples applying for a membership need only state that they are married to receive the family benefit. Management also left the door open to expand the policy to include domestic partners - gay and straight.

To have AAA South set a standard for full equality for all married couples, regardless of sexual orientation, is an important message and one we hope other companies will follow," said Nadine Smith, Executive Director of Equality Florida.

The result, from our perspective, was a very meaningful and productive conversation. Our door is always open," said O'Brien.

MIAMI—On July 24, the City of Miami voted unanimously, 4-0, in favor of a resolution supporting passage of the Military Readiness Enhancement Act, which would repeal Don't Ask, Don't Tell and lift the ban on gays and lesbians serving openly in the U.S. military.

"Picture a person with the skills, expertise and bravery to protect an entire platoon of soldiers in the battlefield. The current rules prevent that would-be hero from sacrificing it all to protect our Democracy – simply because his or her sexual orientation," Commissioner Joe Sanchez said. "We must change the rules, so all of our best and brightest can serve our military."
