





Susan Kliebenstein has left Family of God Community Church and was not able to submit a column for this month's issue, we decided to look back at our very first November column, written by the Rev. Dr. Jerry Seay for the November 2003 issue. Six years is a long time, yet the message, we think, holds true today with only the numbers in the first paragraph being dated: Matthew Shepherd was murdered 9 years ago and Stonewall was 40 years ago. Recently I was reminded that October was the fifth anniversary of the death of Matthew Shepherd in Wyoming. In my e-mails, I am constantly receiving obituaries of many of the leaders of the modern gay movement. Many of those who were present at the Stonewall Riots 34 years ago are no longer among us. Too many of our community have been lost to HIV/AIDS. Even in MCC, which as a denomination just celebrated its 35th anniversary, we have lost so many of our original leaders.


November starts with two very special days which are observed by some religious traditions. November 1 is the Feast of All Saints, when we celebrate our relationship with those who are physically no longer living among us. 
But stuck between our celebrations and our giving of thanks, we find a




special day of responsibility. Election day comes on the first Tuesday of each November. This is our chance to make our voices heard. We have the opportunity to help bring changes to our world every November.






An Obligation

Recently while doing some research on the LGBT hero Cleve Jones, I came across an entry posted by an anonymous person regarding the low turn-out at a LGBT rally in California in support of equal access to Civil marriage. The writer complained that there was almost no attendance at this rally by "twinks" who (I paraphrase) would not be interested in attending anything that did not include drinking and dancing. He bemoaned the lack of interest these young people have in the struggles of the community.

This got me thinking: Is the younger generation of lesbians and gay men failing us... or are we failing them? Do we believe that interest in the LGBT community is fostered in them simply by being members of that community? Or do we have the responsibility of seeing to it that they have the knowledge base that would bring them to a point where they will care about their world and how it can influence and how it can be influenced by the world around us.

Their world: Is there really a separate LGBT world? There most definitely is if one defines "world" as a place where a group of people have a common goal to persevere toward equal status under the law. People of color had a community with a common goal and many roads to reach that goal. They are still working toward it, but

have come miles along that trail from where it began. The LGBT world has also come miles along their journey, some areas of the country have reached goals only dreamed about in other areas. Florida. California. Arizona, Arkansas, Utah and several others have put up barriers, usually at the instigation of misguided religious opinion, which will keep queer people down and in their place. Those of us who have same-sex attraction are the only minority in the United States who can be freely discriminated against through the passage of laws. Florida is one state that has enshrined such discrimination into their Constitution. Their latest amendment forbids civil marriage to same sex couples, and forbids the recognition of such marriagesvalidlyandlegallyperformed in other States. We are forbidden to adopt children in Arkansas and. no surprise, in Florida and in other States. We are discriminated against. Our young people are maligned and go unprotected at school, and may be beaten on their way home. Hate crime legislation may be in place, but such motivation by the perpetrator is hard to prove.

Still, many of our young people are not motivated by this. Many no longer believe the political system can work for them. Many others believe that they deserve what they get. Many come from homes where they have been taught, through parent or



church, that they are unworthy and must accept what they are handed. Many find no way out.

One of the weaknesses in our Gay/ Lesbian Culture is that we don't really know our history, and we don't Mentor. Sure, we know about Stonewall, and we may know a few names such as Gertrude Stein and her lover, Alice B. Toklas. Do we know that such writers as Oscar Wilde, Walt Whitman, Virginia Woolf, Christopher Marlow, Emily Dickinson, Radclyffe Hall, James Baldwin, Marcel Proust, Tennessee Williams, Willa Cather, E.M. Forster and Rita Mae Brown were family to us? Among those who have blazed a political trail on our behalf were such people as Susan B. Anthony, Harvey Milk, Bayard Rustin, Harry Hay, Kate Millett, Barney Frank, Larry Kramer and Michelangelo Signorile, Heroes all, and family of whom we can be proud. The Arts bring many names of those who have attained high levels of perfection in their craft: Ethel Smyth, Rudolf Nureyev, Freddie Mercury, Ian McKellen, Marlene Dietrich, Rock Hudson, Liberace and countless others.

This is, of course, an incomplete list. Our heroes are legion. The names

I've listed are well known to some, but their sexuality may not be. Their names and so many others should be known to all of us. Every one of them has made a significant contribution to who we are, and to the idea that GLBT people can be anything they want, and do what they want to do. They have achieved.

Mentoring is a gift we could give to the younger LGBT people who may be floundering. A Mentor is a trusted counselor. Each of us who has attained adulthood and are living successful day-to-day lives has a gift they can give to those who come behind us. There is still so much negativity directed toward our Community. It comes from the Conservative media, from Fundamentalist Churches, vote-seeking politicians, from some schoolteachers, and from some of the talking heads on television "news" programs. Negativity is all around us. We can befriend younger people for no other reason than to tell them about our experiences. Tell them about our community's history. Let them know what road we have walked and what our battles were. Let them know that true equality is a goal worth pursuing and when necessary, worth fighting for. Let them know that we are here.

we have been here since the world began, and we will be here as long as humankind draws a breath. Let them know that we are here, we are queer and we are **not** going away.

WEST PALM BEACH—From November 20-22, advocates for lesbian, gay, bisexual, and transgender (LGBT) equality will join clergy, educators, mental health professionals and allies at the 2009 Anti-Heterosexism Conference in West Palm Beach, Florida. The conference offers a range of in-depth workshops and is open to everyone who seeks to challenge the harmful affects of heterosexism, reparative therapy, exgay ministries and other efforts to change people's sexual orientation.

"First off, it's important to be clear that the title of the conference is the Anti-Heterosexism Conference, not anti-heterosexual," says Jeff Lutes, Executive Director of Soulforce and one of the organizers of the conference. "Heterosexism is the widespread assumption that heterosexual relationships are somehow superior to same-sex relationships, which leads to all kinds of abuse and discrimination against LGBT people. We want to highlight where heterosexism seeps into the social, cultural, religious and political fabric of society, and how we can begin to unravel its damaging consequences."

Through a weekend-long series of workshops and keynote speakers, conference attendees will learn to challenge heterosexist attitudes and practices, speak out against the dangers of reparative therapy and other conversion efforts, and become strong advocates for LGBT equality.

Keynote speakers for the conference include Dr. Sylvia Rue, Interim Executive Director of the National Black Justice Coalition, Rev. Deborah L...Johnson of Inner Light Ministries, and Dr. Jack Drescher, Distinguished Fellow of the American Psychiatric Association. Joining Soulforce as co-sponsors of the conference are Truth Wins Out, the National Black Justice Coalition, Beyond Ex-Gay, Box Turtle Bulletin and Equality Florida.

The Anti-Heterosexism Conference also serves as a counterweight to the anti-gay think tank, NARTH (National Association

for Research & Therapy of Homosexuality), which will be hosting its annual conference on the same weekend in West Palm Beach. For years NARTH has promoted reparative or "sexual orientation conversion" therapy, claiming that LGBT people can and should change their sexual orientation.

However, after a thorough review of the literature on conversion therapy, the American Psychological Association (APA) concluded that sexual orientation is unlikely to change through therapy and adopted a resolution in August 2009 calling on mental health professionals to avoid telling clients they can change from gay to straight through "therapeutic" efforts or other treatments. The resolution builds on an APA report from 1998, which warned that reparative therapy can lead patients to "depression, anxiety, and self-destructive behavior," because "therapist alignment with societal prejudices against homosexuality may reinforce selfhatred already experienced by the patient."

In November, individuals and organizations from across the country will come together for the Anti-Heterosexism Conference to work through the process of moving beyond the dangers of heterosexism to a more just and equitable environment for LGBT people. "It's time we named the problem," says Lutes, "and begin walking together through the solution."

RENO—A report on proudparenting.com noted that Nevada's domestic partner registration has opened with a quote from The Las Vegas Sun profiles Carline and Jodie - and their three kids - one of nearly 700 families receiving Nevada's first domestic partnership certificates.

"...the oldest daughter, 17-year-old Brenna, is living with relatives in Boise, where she hopes to go to college. Nathan, 14, is a high school freshman who practices karate and is on the cross country team. Thirteen-year-old Dakota competes in pageants, is a cheerleader, dances and plays in the middle school orchestra. The other schoolchildren and the teachers know about Carline and Jodie — after all, they're field trip chaperones. It hasn't been a problem." Last spring Nevada's Legislature debated a domestic partner bill- introduced by state Sen. David Parks, D-Las Vegas.

The legislation will not overturn Nevada's same-sex marriage ban, but it will make Nevada the 10th state with either domestic partnerships or civil unions. It will be a legal document for families to show doctors and employers.

Nevada couples could start registering as domestic partners in advance of the new law that took effect in October.

The Nevada secretary of state's office planned to start taking applications on Monday, August 31.

Same- and opposite-sex couples who apply early could receive their certificates of domestic partnership on October 1.

That's the day the state law goes into effect extending rights similar to those held by married couples to cohabitating couples, whether gay or straight, who register.

There is a \$50 fee and the applications must be notarized.

WASHINGTON, DC—The Boston Globe reported that an article in the Pentagon's top scholarly journal calls in unambiguous terms for lifting the ban on gays serving openly in the armed forces, arguing that the military is essentially forcing thousands of gay men and women to lead dishonest lives in an organization that emphasizes integrity as a fundamental tenet.

The article in the Joint Force Quarterly, which is published for the chairman of the

Joint Chiefs of Staff, was written by an Air Force colonel, who studied the issue for months concludes that having openly gay troops in the ranks will not hurt combat readiness.

While the views do not necessarily reflect those of Pentagon leaders, their appearance in a publication billed as the Joint Chiefs' "flagship" security studies journal signals that the top brass now welcomes a debate in the military over repealing the 1993 law.

Decisions on which articles to publish are made by the journal's editorial board, located at the defense university, the office of Admiral Mike Mullen, the Joint Chiefs chairman, reviewed the article before it was published.

"After a careful examination, there is no scientific evidence to support the claim that unit cohesion will be negatively affected if homosexuals serve openly," writes Colonel Om Prakash, who is now working in the office of Defense Secretary Robert M. Gates. "Based on this research, it is not time for the administration to reexamine the issue; rather

it is time for the administration to examine how to implement the repeal of the ban."

In the 16 years the law has been in effect, more than 12,500 troops have been discharged because their sexual orientation was revealed, either by themselves or others.

Representative Patrick Murphy, a Pennsylvania Democrat and Iraq war veteran, is lobbying for a hearing – possibly later this year or early next year –on legislation that he has proposed that would repeal the ban. The bill has 176 cosponsors; there is no similar legislation pending in the Senate at this time.

Arguing that the law "has been costly both in personnel and treasure" – the cost of discharging service members and recruiting replacements, including those with language or other specialized skills – Prakash lays out a case in his article for why he believes the time has come for repeal.

Acknowledging that allowing gays to serve openly would cause some disruptions in the ranks – including harassment and even violence – he asserts that the disruptions would be manageable and that the military would quickly accept the change. Moreover, he argues that a more equitable policy would actually strengthen unit cohesion.

"No doubt there will be cases where units will become dysfunctional, just as there are today among heterosexual leaders," Prakash writes. "Intervention will be required; such units must be dealt with just as they are today – in a prompt and constructive fashion."

"The law also forces unusual personal compromises wholly inconsistent with a core military value - integrity," he writes. "Several homosexuals interviewed were in tears as they described the enormous personal compromise in integrity they had been making, and the pain felt in serving in an organization they wholly believed in, yet that did not accept them."

He continues: "In an attempt to allow

homosexual service members to serve quietly, a law was created that forces a compromise in integrity, conflicts with the American creed of 'equality for all,' places commanders in difficult moral dilemmas, and is ultimately more damaging to the unit cohesion its stated purpose is to preserve."

Prakash cites the examples of other militaries - including in Australia, Israel, the United Kingdom, and Canada - that allow gays to serve openly. "There was no mass exodus of heterosexuals, and there was no mass 'coming out' of homosexuals," he said.

Prakash also points to recent examples of gay soldiers - including battlefield leaders such as a Marine Corps captain - whose sexual orientation has been known by others in their units, to no discernible effect.

The article is likely to be applauded by gay rights groups that have been lobbying the Obama administration to take action to overturn the ban. But it is also likely to embolden supporters of the current law such as Elaine Donnelly, president of the Center for Military Readiness, a Washington think tank.

She believes that allowing gays to serve openly in all ranks and units - as the Murphy bill stipulates - would severely damage unit cohesion. "It is tantamount to saying that men should share the same living spaces with women," she said. "Society may have changed but the need for good order and discipline has not changed."

Donnelly also contends that the experiences of foreign militaries should not be a guide for the US armed forces, saying that some of them have conscript armies and do not allow gays to serve in elite combat units.

"These are not role models for the United States," she said. "Congress is being asked to impose a risky military social experiment that is duplicated nowhere in the world."

NEW YORK—The New York Times ran an article on the high price of being a gay couple, which explored the dollar penalty of being a committed gay couple without the benefit of legal marriage.

Based on income and cost averages calculated assuming a same-sex couple who is college-educated, 30 to 40 years old

and raising children under the age of 18. Income was assumed to be \$140,000, the average income for a couple in New York, California and Florida – states the article cited as estimated to have the largest gay populations.

Needless to say there were a large number of variables considered including disparity of incomes (where one wage earner makes significantly more than the other), health care coverage by employers including domestic partner or not, costs of moving to a state where same-sex second-parent adoptions are legal, social security, pensions, taxes, inheritance and financial planning.

Where there was a large disparity between incomes, the "cost of being gay" came to nearly a half-million dollars. However with both earning the same amount if fell to just over \$40,000 (about a fifth of the difference was due to the "marriage penalty" on income taxes).

LISBON, PORTUGAL— pinknews.co.uk reported that the re-elected Portuguese prime minister has promised to allow gay marriage.


Gay couples in Portugal are waiting to see whether their re-elected prime minister will follow through with his campaign promise for gay marriage.

José Sócrates and his Socialist Party government were returned to power last weekend but without a parliamentary majority. However, left wing parties occupy a majority of the seats, with all them agreeing with gay marriage.

Portugal, with a large Roman Catholic population, has seen all previous efforts to instigate same-sex marriage hit by heavy resistance from the country's religious groups and conservative politicians.

This year, a lesbian couple tried to challenge the gay marriage ban as unconstitutional but in July, the Portuguese constitutional court upheld the ban on same-sex marriage.

Sunday's voting also saw an openly gay politician elected in Portugal for the first time: Miguel Vale de Almeida, an independent MP for the Socialist Party.

Gay Rights Tidbit: We find that European reports often give us insights in happenings in the US that we don't see elsewhere. For instance while most postings we've seen revolve around the courts rulings forcing the backers of anti-gay marriage initiatives, especially Protect Marriage, to reveal their financial backers, pinknews.co.uk reported that in a pre-trail hearing anti-gay groups were asked to prove how gay marriage threatens traditional unions.

In a challenge of the constitutionality of Proposition 8 by two unmarried couples, the presiding judge has asked anti-gay groups to prove how it affects heterosexual marriage.

Anti-gay group Protect Marriage, which led support for Prop 8, asked US District Chief Judge



Vaughn Walker to throw the case out of court but Walker has refused, meaning the case will go to trial in January. An attorney for Protect Marriage, Charles Cooper, argued that the ban was necessary to foster "naturally procreative relationships".

Then Walker asked: "What is the harm to the procreation purpose you outlined of allowing samesex couples to get married?"

Cooper was forced to admit he did not know. And Walker referred to a recent wedding he had presided over, that of a women in her 80s and a man in her 90s, who he said he did not expect to procreate.

Cooper later cited a study from the Netherlands that found that straight couples were turning toward civil partnerships rather than traditional marriage. When Walker asked whether adverse effects had been found in children, Cooper was again forced to admit he did not know.

January's trial will determine whether gays should be provided with constitutional protections in the same way as racial minorities and whether the ban would protect marriage or comprise an act of hate.

Around 18,000 gay couples wed while gay marriage was legal. Earlier this year, the Supreme Court upheld the ban but ruled that those couples could continue to be legally married.


