Ok, we're **Out on the Coast** of Florida one of the best places to be, so let's get out there and enjoy it and each other!

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

DOC TALK

New challenges associated with HIV infection and treatment.

Since the introduction of highly effective antiviral treatment in 1996 there has been a major decline in AIDS-related infections and deaths, although this trend has begun to level off in the past two years. Longer survival of people living with HIV/AIDS has led to a steady increase in the number of people living with the virus in the U.S.

However, complacency has become pervasive and prevention efforts have dwindled and there has been an increase of unsafe sexual behavior. Recently, rates of syphilis and other sexually transmitted diseases have been spiking along with new cases of HIV, especially in young adults.

Despite advances in therapy, HIV infection remains a devastating illness that impacts all aspects of one's life. The fallout of an HIV diagnosis changes everything - from personal relationships, to employment opportunities, insurability, health coverage, financial security, and overall quality of life. This does not mean that one

cannot live a completely wonderful, integrated life with HIV, but the hurdles and obstacles are much greater.

Although HIV does respond to treatment with a combination of antiviral medications, the drugs have significant side effects and we are still learning about new problems with them as we gain more experience.

The latest problem with antiviral medication is a higher rate of coronary artery disease and heart attacks. Several large studies have clearly shown that antiviral therapy leads to higher cholesterol and triglyceride levels and this translates into a greater chance for heart attacks. This is especially the case for those persons with other known risk factors such as smoking, diabetes, high blood pressure, and a family history of heart problems. The overall risk of heart attacks is low, but it is often necessary for additional medications to be added to treat the cholesterol and this further complicates medical care.

From little kids playing in the rain puddles in the park to adults enjoying the parade and entertainment, there were smiles everywhere. Both hugs and rain showered, love and pride was in the air. It was a small affair, an inclusive affair: people of all colors, genders, ages and orientations coming together to celebrate our Pride.

It was wonderful. It may not have had the dynamics of hundreds of thousands of people, but what it did have was the personal ownership of the event that is lost in huge crowds. You should definitely experience one of the major Pride events especially in San Francisco, but you really can't get a better personal experience than at a small event.

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Spiritually Speaking

In the Christian faith tradition, we are currently in a period of time called "Lent." Lent is traditionally a time to prepare for the Easter Season by giving up something that is important to you. For a period of forty days (not counting Sundays), one is expected to make a sacrifice. People have been known to give up eating meat, bread, chocolate, soft drinks, or almost anything else.

But I wonder what would happen if we each decided to give up preconceived ideas for Lent. Imagine what life would be like if we allowed each person we

know to just be themselves instead of expecting them to be who we want them to be. How many people in our community could breathe easier if they didn't have to defend their lifestyles to their families? Imagine living a day without having to meet the expectations of another person.

Would we be free to change our dress codes, the type of vehicle we drive, or even where we like to go out for fun? Would we be free to choose the person we really want, and not someone just to please our friends or family?

And how much relief would our friends experience if we allowed them just to be themselves. Movies and T.V. shows would have a difficult time creating GLBT characters because there would be no stereotypes. Perhaps we would not find as much disappointment in our lives if we allowed others to be themselves instead of who we expected them to be.

Lent – a time to give up something to improve our world. Maybe we could each expect a little less of each other and become a little easier to live with.

Considering how important religion is to people we feel it is important to address this aspect of our readership's lives. As we meet and speak with spiritual leaders we will strive to include more voices for this column to provide a breadth of thought and ideology.

This space should be a rewarding and, at times, challenging read for those who wish to explore spirituality with an open mind,



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
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


